HEALTH CARE COALITION OF SOUTHERN OREGON AWARDED MULTI-MILLION GRANT FOR HEALTHY START

The Health Care Coalition of Southern Oregon (HCCSO), a key partner organization with Southern Oregon Success, has received a 5-year, \$5.5 million federal Healthy Start Grant administered by HRSA's Maternal and Child Health Bureau. Healthy Start aims to improve health outcomes before, during, and after pregnancy; and, to reduce disparities in rates of infant death as well as negative health outcomes in the first 18 months of life.

Healthy Start grants were awarded to 100 communities with infant mortality rates at least 1.5 times the U.S. national average, and with high rates of other negative maternal and infant outcomes. The program will target Josephine and Douglas Counties, with a special focus on reaching families in the most rural parts of these counties.



Health Care Coalition will work in collaboration with Community Health Clinics and WIC programs to deliver services in this region. Funding will support a wide range of services for women, children, and families, including: healthcare coordination; case management; linkage to social services; screening and counseling for alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use; breastfeeding support; reproductive life planning; child development education; and, parenting support. In addition, funding will strengthen the health workforce to provide such services, build a more effective and efficient service-delivery system, and promote and improve health equity across participating organizations.

Data from the National Center for Health Statistics shows that poor social conditions (e.g., poverty), maternal health behaviors (e.g., smoking), and disadvantaged community environments (e.g. less access to health care services) impact infant health and infant mortality. In 2013-2015, total infant and post-neonatal mortality rates were highest in rural counties. (Read more here: https://www.cdc.gov/nchs/data/databriefs/db300.pdf

"The goal of Healthy Start is to ensure that women experiencing high rates of poverty, limited access to care, and other socioeconomic factors can have healthy pregnancies and raise healthy children," said Maggie Sullivan, Executive Director of Health Care Coalition and member of the Southern Oregon Success Steering Committee. "Healthy Start aims to address the factors that can interfere with this goal and to provide every woman, child, and family with the best chances to thrive."

JACKSON COUNTY COMMUNITY JUSTICE OPENS RESOURCE CENTER

As has happened in Josephine County, Jackson County Community Justice has changed the way individuals are released from custody upon completion of their sentence. Releases had been occurring at different times, including some as late as 2 am. Releases are now coordinated to take place at 8 am, and people released are offered a van ride to the Community Justice office in Medford, where a Resource Room has been set up to assist with successful re-entry into the community.

The room is staffed by Goodwill, DHS and others to see if basic needs are being addressed. There is also job counseling, with the agency having done outreach to employers (many in the fast food or hotel industries) who are willing to interview people with a record. This is a great example of community as one of the core protective systems of resilience.

RESILIENT COMMUNITIES: THE ILLINOIS VALLEY



A "Caring Community" is growing in the Illinois Valley, a collaborative group who believe that by working together, they are best able to promote healthy living for young children and families. The group focuses on parent education, positive family friendly activities, school readiness and easy access to resources.

Members of the Caring Community include Evergreen Elementary School, Illinois Valley Community Development Organization, Illinois Valley Family Coalition, DHS Self-Sufficiency, Early Head Start, the Family Connection, Project Baby Check, the Pregnancy Center, Illinois Valley Safe House Alliance, AllCare and Healthy U.

Any group or individual working in the collaboration's focus areas is welcome to join, as long as they are able to attend 6 or 7 of the Caring Community's 10 meetings each year and have passed criminal background checks before engaging with the public. The group typically meets 8:30 am to 9:30 am on the first Wednesday of the month, expect for July and January.
