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Oregon's Quality Rating and Improvement System News

Two important messages about Spark from The Research Institute (TRI) at Western Oregon University, which administers the program:

*** Additional funding is available!**

Great News! Programs that are participating in Spark can qualify for **additional funding, from \$1,000 - \$2,000**, to help with their continuous quality improvement efforts!

This opportunity will begin in July and is only available until September 30, 2019. To be eligible, programs must have a current Commitment to Quality (C2Q) or Star rating or will be participating by September 30th. If a program has not yet submitted a portfolio they have until September 30th to do so, or can get signed approval from a CCRN Quality Improvement Specialist. Call CCRN with any questions on eligibility or to get involved.

*** Time to complete the Spark Program Update Report (SPUR)**

Beginning in May, 2019, Spark, Oregon's Quality Rating and Improvement System, requires that all programs that have been participating in Spark for a year or longer complete the **Spark Program Update Report**.

Programs will receive this report through email or mail. **Completing this report is required for programs to remain in good standing** and be eligible for future Spark funding and support.

Child Care Licensing Rule Clarification



CCRN has received some questions from providers wondering if children who will be entering kindergarten in the fall are considered preschool or school age when determining teacher/child ratios.

This rule has changed, and the answer is that a child who will be entering kindergarten in the fall is considered school age “from the end of the prior school year to the start of the kindergarten school year.” So the summer before a child enters kindergarten, the child is considered school age, not preschool age, for ratio purposes.

Napping Rules Update

Registered and Certified Family Providers should have received information on rules updates regarding **supervision of sleeping children**, with the goal of preventing SIDS, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.

Updated rules state that the provider must be on the same floor of the home as napping children, the door of the room where children are napping must be open and have enough light to easily see children's faces, and background noise must be low. Monitors can supplement supervision, but do not replace it; all requirements still apply.

Counting with Pictures: Better Math for Kids



Counting pictures of items rather than the items themselves is a stronger way to support a child's concept of cardinality, according to a study from the University of Chicago and the University of Notre Dame.

Counting with Pictures

Cardinality is the concept that the final number used to count items in a set refers to the total number of items in that set, and is important to a child's developing math skills.

Early Learning Workforce Survey

Children Winter Conference last February you may have completed a workforce survey (and might have won a raffle prize, too).

Southern Oregon Early Learning Services Hub (SOELS) was collecting feedback from early educators on their experiences as part of the early learning workforce and had 123 survey responses.

The questions were developed to learn more about early learning professionals' experiences around professional development, recruitment and retention, resources, the early learning system, and job satisfaction and challenges.

The results were very interesting and SOELS wanted to share the collective feedback.




Exploring Water Beads
